General Information

School of the Scripture reserves the right to make changes to any policies and/or procedures with prior notice.

I. Admission

Regular student (full or part time) applicants must...

- I. Be at least 16 years of age
- II. Be a Christian and be willing to grow in discipleship
- III. Have earned a high school diploma with a minimum average of 60% in the grade 12 year. Grade 12 courses should include English. (GED also acceptable)

Transfer Students must have...

- I. A minimum of 65% in courses they wish to transfer to School of the Scripture. Courses from other institutions will be evaluated on an individual basis.
- II. No unsettled obligations or grievances in previous institution(s).
- III. A clear testimony of spiritual growth.

Advanced student

First-year students who have successfully completed at least one year of post-secondary academic studies may enroll in some upper level courses in consultation with the Academic Dean.

Conditional Admission

Certain students may qualify for a conditional offer of admission when...

- I. The applicant is waiting for final transcripts.
- II. The student has less than a 60% average

III. The student was on a modified program (including those who did not take English12)
IV. The student has not completed high school or GED (must be a minimum of 21 years of age and have been out of school for at least one year). These applications for admission will be considered on an individual basis.

Continuing Student (2nd year or BA)

Continuing students are those who have completed a year of studies at School of the Scripture. Second Year 35-60 hours BA or 3rd & 4th years 70-120 hours In order to continue with studies at School of the Scripture, students need...

- a minimum GPA of 2.5 for 2nd year, and 2.5 for 3rd & 4th years (deficiency results in being assigned to Academic Assistance; in some cases re-admission may be denied.)
- no unsettled obligations or grievances from previous school year

Home Study (Distant Learning) Student

School of the Scripture welcomes applicants from graduates of home-based schools and from other unaccredited and/or non-traditional secondary education programs. Home-study students should consider providing us with SAT or ACT scores or GED marks. They should also provide all information requested for full time onsite students.

Registration

- A. Registration dates will be announced prior to the beginning of each quarter.
- B. Students who desire to attend School of the Scripture must complete a registration packet including an application for admission.
- C. A transcript from all colleges previously attended must accompany the application for admission

Acceptance of Credit in Transfer

The Dean of Academic Affairs will evaluate credits previously earned at other post secondary institutions. The Academic Dean will determine which credits are transferable.

The student should be aware that these degree programs may or may not transfer. The receiving institution determines the transfer of course/degree credit.

Tuition

Tuition is charged according to the number of credit hours for which a student is enrolled. Tuition is subject to change with prior notice by the officers of School of the Scripture.

Tuition Installment Pay Plan

School of the Scripture offers an installment plan for students to pay their tuition and fees. The installment plan must be initiated before the first day of class. One half (50%) of the total payment is required at the initiation unless otherwise approved by the Dean. One-quarter (25%) of the remaining balance is due prior to the fifth week, and the final installment must be paid prior to the tenth week of class. Promissory notes must be signed at the time the first payment is made. A late fee of \$10.00 will be assessed for each delinquent installment payment.

If courses are dropped after the designated deadline, all unpaid installments shall become due and payable. Course credit(s) may be denied for students who have not paid their balances in full by the end of the quarter. Students will not be allowed to register for future courses until all previous financial obligations have been met.

Additional Fees

Additional fees may be assessed as new programs are developed with special costs.

To participate in commencement exercises, students will be assessed a \$25.00 graduation fee. All graduates will be responsible for cap and gown rentals and other accessories required for the ceremony.

Registration Fee

There will be a \$35.00 non-refundable registration fee assessed each quarter.

Transcript Request Fee

A fee of \$5.00 will be assessed for each official transcript request.

Refund Policy

Students who officially withdraw from all or portions of their classes shall have their tuition and certain fees refunded according to the following schedule:

- Prior to the first class day of the quarter – 100%
- During the second through the fifteenth day – 50%
- After the fifteenth day - none

Refunds checks will be mailed within 30 days from withdrawal.

Registration fees are non-refundable even if one is due a refund.

The “first class day” means the first day all classes begin for the quarter.

Returned Checks

Checks returned for insufficient funds must be paid with cash within the time limits prescribed by the notification letter. The School of the Scripture will assess an additional fee of \$25.00 for returned checks. Students may be dropped due to return checks and legal actions may be sought.

II. Academic Information

An incomplete (I) may be given when an unforeseen emergency prevents a student from completing course work. The “I” shall be converted to a performance grade (A-F) within 30 days after the first day of class in the subsequent regular quarter. If the work is not completed after 30 days, the “I” will be converted to a performance grade: usually a grade of an F.

Grades and Grade Point Averages

Final grades are reported according to the following grading system:

Grade points earned for each course are determined by multiplying the grade point value times the number of credits assigned to the course. For example, a student who takes a three-hour course and earns an “A” accumulates 12 grade points for that course.

To compute a student’s grade point average (GPA), find the sum of the Grade Points and divide by the number of Attempted Credits for the same period. For example, a student who takes the following courses and earns the identified grades has a 2.93 GPA:

Procedures for Filing Diploma Plans and For Graduation

Students should request a Diploma Plan from the Registrar's Office no later than the end of their third quarter. At the time of this request, students shall ensure official transcripts (from other post secondary institutions) are on file in the Registrar's Office. Failure to provide official transcripts may delay participation in the commencement exercises.

An annual graduation ceremony will be held at the conclusion of each spring quarter. Students who have completed their respective programs of studies and satisfied all financial obligations will be eligible to participate in the commencement exercise. Instructions for graduation will be mailed prior to commencement

School of the Scripture reserves the right to modify curricula as appropriate.

The student has the ultimate responsibility of registering for courses that will satisfy graduation requirements.

Late Work

Late work will be accepted at the discretion of the instructor.

Make-up Work

Students with an approved or excused absence will be allowed to make-up work at the discretion of the instructor.

Dropping a Course or Withdrawing From the School of the Scripture

To drop a class or withdraw from the school, students must follow the prescribed procedure. It is the student's responsibility to drop or withdraw. Failure to do so will result in receiving a performance grade: usually a grade of an "F".

Should circumstances prevent a student from appearing in person to drop a class/withdraw, the student may complete the process via a written request forwarded to the Registrar. This request must be received in the Registrar's Office by the quarter's deadline. Telephone inquires are not accepted to initiate or complete this process. Students who drop a class or

withdraw from the College before the quarter's deadline shall receive a "W" (Withdrawal) on their transcripts. The deadline for receiving this status is indicated on the academic calendar and current class schedule.

III. Distant Learning Program (Home Study)

School of the Scripture offers a home-study program for students who are unable to attend on-campus classes. The program consists of assignments that will enable individuals to gain full knowledge of the subject offered. A distant learning course syllabus will be provided (mailed, e-mailed or faxed) to each student with course objective, reading assignments, written assignments, exams and due dates.

The cost is \$30.00 per quarter hour. Also assessed is a \$35.00 nonrefundable registration fee. Students are responsible for purchasing textbooks and other required materials for the course.

Seminars for Credit

Students will be given opportunities to attend various seminars throughout the calendar year. Credits for attending these seminars will be granted. Additional information will be provided as seminars are scheduled. Academic Dean will determine credits given. The maximum credits given for seminars will be 2 credits.

Projects for Credit

At the discretion of the dean, students will be allowed to complete various ministerial related projects for college credits. The Dean of Academic Affairs will identify the requirements for these projects. The maximum credits given for ministerial related projects will be 3 credits

Life Experience Credit

Students may receive life experience credits for various ministerial works. Academic Dean will determine credits given. The maximum credits given for life and/or ministerial experiences will be 20 credits for degree programs. The maximum credits given for life and/or ministerial experiences will be 6 credits for certificate programs.

Scholarships

School of the Scripture has a limited amount of scholarships available for students who show unusual financial need. Contact the Registrar's Office for more information.

Quarters

School of the Scripture divides the calendar year into (4) quarters. Each quarter consist of (10) weeks of study for both on-site and distant learning courses. (See yearly schedule)

ASSOCIATE IN BIBLICAL STUDIES DEGREE PROGRAM

Christian Leadership Training - Leadership in the 21st century is different than it was in previous generations. By almost all accounts it's harder due to the changes in culture. Almost every area of life from politics to education to business to the Church is crying that there is a shortage of leaders today. What happened? And what can we do about it? In this class we will be looking at leadership. We will discover that though there are some naturally gifted leaders, leadership can be learned. So we'll study models of effective leaders, overall principles of Christian leadership, and practical strategies to move an organization from today into tomorrow.

MN 201 - Church Planting: A practical training course including the church planter himself, advertising, financing, services, organization, location, sermons, legal needs, and more. Vital information for starting a New Testament church in this age. (3 Hours)

MN 202 - Church Building: This course provides the necessary information for church growth. It involves such subjects as taking a church, charting her course, and accomplishing steady growth through Biblical and practical methodology. (3 Hours)

MN 203 - Introduction to Missions: A series showing the making, mandate, manpower, mechanics, money, masters, and magnification of missions. (3 Hours)

MN 301 - Pastoral Counseling: Foundations of Biblical counsel is taught. Need, qualifications, goal, and survey of other methods are just a few among the many items communicated by the instructor. (3 Hours)

MU 201 – Christian Music Theory: A basic overview course on the subject of music and it's importance in the New Testament church. (3 Hours)

ED 301 – Computer Literacy for Christians: Introduction to Windows, word processing, database, and spreadsheet functions of PC computer, with emphasis on biblical research. (3 Hours)

ED 302 – Christian Child Growth and Development: Characteristics of students from toddler through adulthood with an emphasis on how to teach at the various levels with emphasis on Christian morals and ethics. (3 Hours)

BI 413,414 - Minor Prophets I, II: A thorough study of the small but potent prophecies prior, during, and after the fall of Israel and Judah. Minor Prophets I - Hosea through Micah. Minor Prophets II - Nahum through Malachi. (3 Hours Each)

BI 311,312 - Major Prophets I, II: An analytical study of the historical backgrounds and major prophetic messages of Isaiah, Jeremiah, Lamentations, Ezekiel, and Daniel. These classes are best suited for consecutive consideration and study. (3 Hours Each)

TS 401 - Written Biblical Thesis: A 10,000 word dissertation stating and proving a truth related to the ministry, under the supervision and guidance of an advisor. (3 Hours)

BR 309 - Biblical Ethics: An examination of the Biblical basis for making ethical decisions. Building on the foundation of God's revelation to Moses, the prophets, Jesus, and the apostles, students will apply these teachings to issues ranging from personal moral responsibility to major social issues facing the world today. (3 hours)

COM 101 – 103 – Computers for the Christian Student – Introduction to Computers, learning basic skills and Principles of Microsoft Office with focus on the work of the ministry.

CO 401 – Christian Marriage and Family Counseling: Theory and practice of marriage and family counseling; emphasis on a systemic approach to family therapy. (3 hours)

LA 301 - Hebrew I: Introduction to the grammar of Biblical Hebrew. Emphasis on vocabulary, forms, and basic syntax; includes reading of Hebrew text aloud. No knowledge of foreign languages is assumed. (3 hours)

LA 302 - Hebrew II: Continuation of the study of Hebrew grammar; completion of the strong verb and overview of weak verbs. Reading selected Hebrew prose texts. (3 hours)

LA 303 - Greek I: The vocabulary, forms, and grammar of New Testament Greek. (3 hours)

LA 304 - Greek II: Continuing study of the vocabulary, forms, and grammar of New Testament Greek. Translation of I and II John, John 1-2. (3 hours)

YM 277 - Introduction to Youth Ministry: Examination of foundational issues in youth ministry, including developing a philosophy of youth ministry, components of a balanced youth ministry program, and how to begin a new youth ministry. (2 hours)

YM 278 - Youth Ministry Resources and Methods: A hands-on approach to exploring various resources and methods used to present a dynamic and uplifting youth program grounded in evangelism, discipleship, fellowship, worship, and service. Specific areas of exploration include professional journals; interactive teaching techniques; and resources for counseling, technology, Bible teaching, and program planning for youth and family. (3 hours)

YM 378 - Youth Ministry Planning and Administration: Issues involved in administering a comprehensive youth program, including dealing with change, conflict management, time management, goal setting, staff relationships, managing youth workers, personal spiritual growth, and organizational management. (3 hours)

MASTER DEGREE PROGRAM

Master in Christian Counseling (M.C.C.)

Program scope: Our desire is to train up biblically based, Spirit-anointed compassionate counselors who can discern the needs of the heart and usher in the grace of God to meet those needs; to train up people to counsel using the techniques and skills, which Jesus Christ used. 150-credit program provides training for life and ministry, recommending courses in the area of Christian counseling and theology. Program will also provide solid foundation to build upon for higher level of studies in Doctorate degree programs.

Required Courses:

PS 310 Christian Abnormal Psychology

An introduction to the classification, description, and interpretation of behavior identified as abnormal. Emphasis given to the social variables and environmental conditions related to the acquisition and persistence of such Christian behavior. (3 Hours)

PS 321 Christian Psychology of Communication

This course examines the dynamics of communication, particularly in group settings; committees, task forces, church boards, small groups, etc. Topics include factors that influence communications and relationships, verbal and non-verbal behavior, barriers to effective communication, persuasion, attitude change, motivation and conflict resolution. Current theory and skill exercises will be utilized. (3 Hours)

PS 325 Social Christian Psychology

Individual behaviors within the context of one's society. A study of how Christian people think about, influence and relate to one another, including attitudes, beliefs, prejudices, aggression, leadership, altruism, conformity, attraction, persuasion, stereotypes and the like. (3 Hours)

PS 336 Developmental Christian Psychology

Explores the ways in which human physical growth and intellectual and social behavior change over time, and seeks to find how growth and behavior relate to one another and their implications for Christian educational systems. (3 Hours)

PS 341 Adult Christian Psychology

Examination of Christian adult development dynamics from early adulthood through old age, which involves such states and issues as 20-30_marriage, children, career; 40-50_"empty nest", care of older parents, mental health; 60_retirement, physical difficulties, death. (3 Hours)

PS 345 Christian Assertiveness Training

Designed to give students a clear understanding between passive, aggressive, and assertive behavior, as well as to help them identify and accept personal rights, keeping with Christian morals and ethics. Students experience assertive behavior in small groups through role-playing. (2 Hours)

PS 458 Practicum in Christian Counseling

Students will have the opportunity of Christian counseling under supervision in real and simulated situations. (2 Hours)

Master in Religious Education (M.R.E.)

Program scope: Our aim is to provide students with a Religious education that will not only help them understand and teach the Bible but will also transform their lives. This is an ideal program for Christian ministers and workers who desire a systematic study of scripture.

Note: The coursework required for this program will not meet Arkansas requirements for teacher or counseling certification/licensure.

Required Courses:

CE 346 Educational Ministries of the Church

This course will give students a theoretical and practical framework for developing educational/ministry programs for children, youth and adults. Students will apply philosophical and psychological theories in evaluating and developing these programs in the church. (3 Hours)

PH 201 Western Philosophical Thought from a Christian Perspective

Introduction to the development of philosophy in the Western World and aesthetics. This course also introduces history of philosophical ideas from the Greeks to the present. (3 Hours)

TH 251 Christian Thought and Dispensational Theology

The essential ideas of dispensational theology in relationship to other types of Christian thought; the major distinctive ideas of Christianity. (3 Hours)

TH 314 Historic Christian Theologians

An examination of several theologians who have made significant contributions to the Christian faith (i.e., Augustine, Aquinas, Luther, etc.). Attention will be given to primary sources. (3 Hours)

TH 315 Contextualization of Theology

A study of the issue of contextualization as it relates to theology from the following

perspectives: approaches, usage, configuration, exposition, implications, and confrontation.
(3 Hours)

TH 318 Dispensational Theology and Theological Method

The four branches of theology, method in Catholic and Protestant theology, varieties of Christian thought, doctrinal development and evangelical theology today; dispensational theology in the context of each element of method. (3 Hours)

MASTER DEGREE

Master Degrees require 30 credits of work beyond the Bachelor's level of (120 credits) and are offered for those who desire specialized advanced training in a specific area. Since the student is at a point of developing mastery in his life, one demonstration of this mastery will be the student's involvement in working in conjunction with his advisor in selecting the courses for his degree.

30-credit Master's degrees generally include:

Approximately (17 credits) of courses.

Master's thesis (3 credits).

Approximately (10 credits) of practica. Practica will require students to exercise their gifts and talents in their respective area of study under supervision in real and simulated situations.

The student will work together with the Academic Dean and Academic Counselor in designing a program from the courses offered that will meet his or her desire for growth in the area(s) in which God has placed a passion in his or her heart.

Many students come to School of the Scripture with a B.A. from another college. They desire to take the unique courses, which School of the Scripture has developed and offered, on the undergraduate level. This can be accomplished in the following ways.

You will begin with the course syllabus for the undergraduate course. This will lay out a foundational program in the area of your interest and will require two or three resources for your meditation. You will complete this and add further research, study and meditation choosing one of the suggestions below. A three-credit course would still be worth three credits. There are several possible avenues you may pursue, including but not limited to the following:

1. You may read other books on the topic and write a report on them. This report should include:
 - a. A summary of the truths, principles and concepts taught in the book;
 - b. A record of what the Lord has said to you specifically through the book; and
 - c. Any ways in which your life has been changed as a result of your meditation on this book.

2. You may do a biblical research project on a topic related to any of the course objectives. (Biblical Dissertation for instructions on how to do such a project will be provided)
3. You may do a research project based on other than biblical sources on a topic related to any of the course objectives.
4. You may prepare an original sermon, Bible study, study guide, or other instructional format to present what you have learned.
5. You may teach the 10-week course to a group after you have completed it. If you choose this option, you will receive one extra credit free of charge. Teaching a 5-8 hour weekend seminar on the topic will fulfill the graduate-level requirement, but you will not receive an extra credit.

Limits: A maximum of 20 credits may be awarded for the total of both transfer credits from other institutions and from credits earned for life experience. Of these 20, no more than 10 may come from credits earned for life experience.

DOCTORATE DEGREE PROGRAM

Doctorate in Christian Counseling (D.C.C.)

Program scope: Our desire is to train up biblically based, Spirit-anointed compassionate counselors who can discern the needs of the heart and usher in the grace of God to meet those needs; to train up people to counsel using the techniques and skills, which Jesus Christ used. 150-credit program provides training for life and ministry, recommending courses in the area of Christian counseling and theology. Program will also provide solid foundation to build upon for higher level of studies in Doctorate degree programs.

Note: The coursework required for this program will not meet Arkansas requirements for teacher or counseling certification/licensure.

Required Courses:

PS 281 Statistics in Theology

Introductory course with applications in business and social sciences. Topics include descriptions of sample data, theoretical frequency distributions, sampling, testing hypotheses, chi-square, correlation, and regression. (3 Hours)

PS 347 Psychology of Christian Personality

An examination of various theories of Christian personality and counseling with emphasis upon those theories that are in prevalent usage in the United States today. (3 Hours)

PS 348 Foundations in Christian Counseling

This course helps the student begin to develop a solid foundation for building his/her own counseling model. Students will use a wide variety of counseling skills and will master practical strategies. As an integral part of the counseling process, students will also interact with other class members to experience such concepts as responding with understanding, concreteness, genuineness, immediacy in communication, unconditional positive regard, defenses, motivation and confrontation. (3 Hours)

PS 351 Christian Educational Psychology

Principles of learning theory and their application in the classroom. A study of the learner, the learning process and the varied factors which influence Christian learning. (3 Hours)

PS 457 Seminar in Christian Counseling

This course continues the process of developing counseling skills by using a problem/management, opportunity/development model that allows different theoretical approaches to be incorporated, including Christian viewpoints. Videotaped real and/or simulated sessions are a part of the student's experience. (3 Hours)

Doctorate in Religious Education (D.R.E.)

Program scope: Our aim is to provide students with a Religious education that will not only help them understand and teach the Bible but will also transform their lives. This is an ideal program for Christian ministers and workers who desire a systematic study of scripture.

Note: The coursework required for this program will not meet Arkansas requirements for teacher or counseling certification/licensure.

Required Courses:

TH 411 God, Creation, and Revelation

A study of theism, biblical revelation and inspiration, nature, attributes and decrees of God, and the biblical concepts of creation, preservation, and providence. (3 Hours)

TH 412 Man, Christ, and Salvation

Biblical doctrine of man, the person and work of Christ, and the provision and application of salvation. (3 Hours)

TH 414 Studies in Dispensational Theology

This course provides special studies in dispensational problems, the literature of modern dispensational theology and its opponents, and its historical roots. (3 Hours)

TH 449 Independent Study in Theology

Individual guided research in problems of theology. (3 Hours)

TH 513 Holy Spirit, Church, and Consummation

Personality, deity, and work of the Holy Spirit; nature and function of the church with emphasis on the Pauline concept of the church; study of the biblical teaching about the future. (3 Hours)

DOCTORATE DEGREE

Doctorate Degrees require 30 credits of work beyond the Master's level. These credits may come from a combination of: 1) courses taken; 2) an original thesis or ministry project; and 3) a practicum or internship experience.

30-credit Doctorate degrees generally include:

Approximately (17 credits) of courses.

Doctorate thesis (3 credits).

Approximately (10 credits) of practica. Practica will require students to exercise their gifts and talents in their respective area of study under supervision in real and simulated situations.

The student will work together with the Academic Dean and Academic Counselor in designing a program from the courses offered that will meet his or her desire for growth in the area(s) in which God has placed a passion in his or her heart.

- 1. Courses taken:** The student may choose courses from anywhere in the School of the Scripture catalog. If he chooses an undergraduate course, additional work will be added to fulfill the graduate-level requirements.
- 2. Original dissertation or ministry project (optional):** This can be an original written work, or the creation of a ministry work. Uniqueness and/or originality will be key evaluation points of this project. If a written project, it should keep a balance between original textual research (in Scripture and secondary literature) and a practical testing of the thesis in real life. Somehow the ministry work or the original written work should add a new perspective to the knowledge and practice of the topic addressed by the thesis.
- 3. Practicum or internship:** We also encourage a portion of the doctoral degree be from real life ministry experience.

Limits: A maximum of 20 credits may be awarded for the total of both transfer credits from other institutions and from credits earned for life experience. Of these 20, no more than 10 may come from credits earned for life
